We are excited to report the successful completion of the Nyagafunzo suspended trail bridge project. Thanks to generous support and engagement from Tony Gee and Knights Brown, together with the local communities we were able to complete the construction of a 77 meters long trail bridge, inaugurated in July of 2023.

The Nyagafunzo trail bridge now serves two communities with over 3,300 beneficiaries in the rural Nyamasheke District in the Western Province of Rwanda. The bridge connects these communities to the nearest hospital, government services, markets, and both primary and secondary schools. The Nyagafunzo trail bridge will now provide safe access for individuals who were once putting their lives in jeopardy to seek opportunity.

The following pages of this report will show the incredible impact your support has had on the communities surrounding the Nyagafunzo bridge. We look forward to continuing our partnership in the years to come. Thank you, once again, for your support in providing safe access.

MISSION

We build bridges to better lives in rural communities.

THE CHALLENGE

Globally, one in seven people lack safe, year-round access to the services and opportunities in their immediate surroundings, due to the lack of transportation infrastructure.

WHY TRAILBRIDGES?

Trailbridges link resources and services to the people who benefit from them the most, serving as a single intervention that addresses a myriad of symptoms. Safe, reliable access impacts day-to-day behavior and influences long-term decision-making. Connecting rural communities is a cost-effective, efficient tool for improving livelihoods and well-being.





RWANDA TRAILBRIDGE PROGRAM

By 2024, 220+ bridges will be completed by B2P in Rwanda, connecting 660,000+ people to critical resources. In July 2019, Bridges to Prosperity launched a five-year program to connect communities across Rwanda through a partnership with the Ministries of Infrastructure, Finance, and Economic Planning, and Local Government, with the common goal of providing connection for over 1,100,000 residents.



UGANDA TRAILBRIDGE PROGRAM

B2P has been building bridges in partnership with the Ugandan government since 2017. In the first years of implementation, B2P Uganda focused on laying strong foundational partnerships with the Uganda National Roads Authority and Ministry of Works and Transport. Currently, B2P and the Government of Uganda are strategically planning an expanded partnership to drive development of rural transport infrastructure across Uganda.



ETHIOPIA TRAILBRIDGE PROGRAM

The Leona M. and Harry B. Helmsley Charitable Trust has provided a generous grant in support of a three-year partnership between Helvetas and B2P in Ethiopia. The TRAIL-Ethiopia program seeks to replicate Helvetas' successful government-owned Amhara program in five additional regions, building the enabling environment to resource the construction of thousands of trailbridges and millions of kilometers in feeder trails in the country in the future and developing a global platform to share learnings and innovations. By the end of the program, we will have built 150 bridges, connecting over 1.3M people to critical resources.

SAFE ACCESS IS CRITICAL



Safe access is necessary to thrive.

The Mugonero is often flooded during the rainy season, being very dangerous to cross. The members of the communities surrounding the bridge would try to cross the river risking their lives to reach the health center, the school, and the market.

Many people were injured while trying to cross the river in the past, and there are 4 official records of people who died trying to reach the opposite shore of the Mugonero.



NYAGAFUNZO TRAIL BRIDGE PROJECT

In June 2023, Bridges to Prosperity staff, the local community, and an amazing team of volunteers from Tony Gee and Knights Brown worked for two weeks to complete the construction of the Nyagafunzo Suspended Trail bridge.
















STORIES FROM THE BUILD TEAM


The team's dedication and tireless efforts have made a significant impact in improving the lives of countless individuals in the community.
